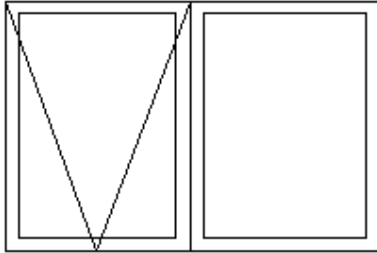


FIXED SASHES

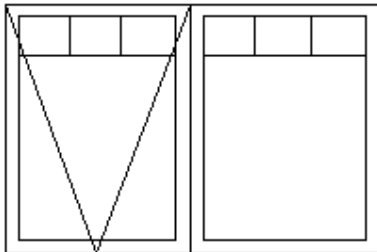
What is a fixed sash?

- A fitted timber section to a window that has an appearance similar to that of an operable sash section. A fixed sash generally ensures the same glass height and/or width as the operable section.

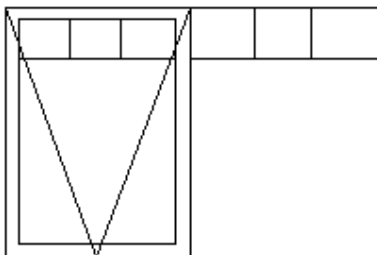
Examples:



Awning window with **fixed sash** to right hand side.



Awning window with **fixed sash** (to RHS) and heritage colonial bars. Note how fixed sash ensures same glass panel size to upper panes.



Awning window with **fixed glass** only (to RHS) and heritage colonial bars. Note how glass panel sizes to upper panes differ.

Please note that fixed sashes are fixed into our frames by a surrounding timber bead. This ensures correct sealing of the window against weathering.

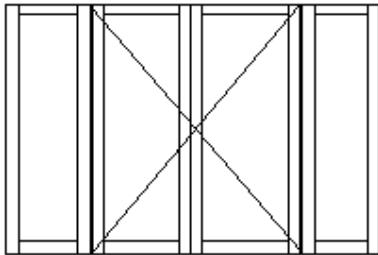
Fixed sashes are not Aspect Windows standard method of window construction and must be requested at time of quoting or ordering. Extra costs do apply for fixed sashes.

FIXED DOORS

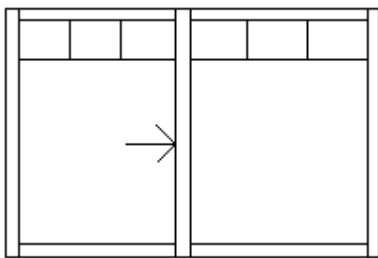
What is a fixed Door?

- A fitted timber section to a sliding door, fixed window or entry frame that has an appearance similar to that of an operable door section. A fixed sash generally ensures the same glass height and/or width as the operable section.

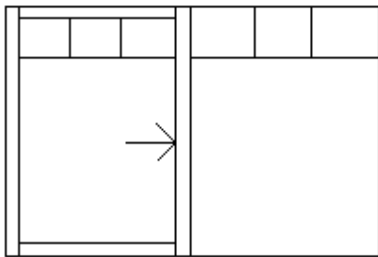
Examples:



French door unit with **fixed doors** to sidelights.



Sliding Door with **fixed door** (to RHS) and heritage colonial bars. Note how fixed door ensures same glass panel size to upper panes.



Sliding Door with **fixed glass** only (to RHS) and heritage colonial bars. Note how glass panel sizes to upper panes differ.

Please note that fixed doors are fixed into our frames by a surrounding timber bead. This ensures correct sealing of the unit against weathering.

Fixed doors are not Aspect Windows standard method of frame construction and must be requested at time of quoting or ordering. Extra costs do apply for fixed doors and may lead to units being site glazed where frames are of excess weights.
